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**Course Description**

This course surveys the great civilizations of the Old and New Worlds, including Mesopotamia, Egypt, India, China, Mesoamerica, and the Andes. We will explore what civilization is, why it arose several times in different parts of the world, and what ancient civilizations have in common.

**Learning Outcomes**

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Describe the primary characteristics of ancient civilizations
- Identify the world's earliest civilizations and recognize their characteristic material remains
- Explain the role of agriculture, economy, and authority in the emergence of civilizations
- Compare and contrast the factors that led to the collapse of civilizations

## Map Quiz and Documentary Quizzes

One map quiz will be assigned in class and each student will have 30 minutes to complete the quiz. In addition, four documentary quizzes will be assigned via D2L. Guidelines will be provided for note-taking, but each student is responsible for their own note-taking during screening of the documentaries. Each documentary quiz will consist of 10 questions, each worth 0.5 points, for a maximum of 5 points. Each quiz will be open for one week only, following the screening of the documentary in class.

**Attendance**
