COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course, we will address research methods in the study of primate social systems. The laboratory component consists of instruction in observational methodology and exercises, primarily at the Calgary Zoo. We will take students through the various stages of the research process, including research topics and hypotheses, methodology, data collection, analysis, and presentation. The goal is to help students develop the skills to conduct advanced, independent research in primatology, whether in captivity or in a field environment.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Prior completion of ANTH 311 is required for this course. Students are expected to attend lectures and to participate in all assigned exercises. Much of the work for this course will be conducted at the Calgary Zoo, and attendance for many labs is mandatory. Students are responsible for materials covered in the textbooks and videos.
