Prerequisite: Consent of the department. **Co-requisites: ANTH 553 and ANTH 552**

1- Course Description: This course will build on the students' knowledge of primatology by providing the opportunity to compile and analyze behavioral data collected by the students in ANTH 552. The guiding questions for the research project along with the research protocol will have been developed in ANTH 553 and refined in ANTH 552.

2- Learning Outcomes:

At the end of ANTH 505, students will have:

- Extracted and compiled behavioral data in relation to their research hypotheses.
- Perform a simple analysis of behavioral data to test their research hypotheses
- Build a narrative (through the introduction and the discussion of their report) on the interpretation of this data
- Used primary literature to enhance their own understanding of their results
- Produced a research report
- Reflected critically on their research hypotheses and research design

3- Evaluation:

- **Research project** (100%); Upon return to Calgary, students will have to compile the data they collected and write a research report. The report will be due 3 weeks after returning to Calgary. If you travel in Africa or Europe after the program, your report is due 3 weeks after being back in Calgary (give date to P.S. during ANTH 553).

Your research report will be a scientific report, which should include an introduction, a section on hypotheses and predictions, a methodology section, results and discussion. Please use descriptive statistics when appropriate. I do not expect you will need to use statistical tests. **Research project reports are done individually**. As your report is a

scientific report, I expect you will complement the various sections of your paper (particularly the introduction and discussion) with relevant studies outside of the papers that have been suggested or provided in the program.

Please submit data collection sheets, compilation, analysis and actual report.
