COURSE OUTLINE

This course is a general introduction to archaeology. There are two lectures each week and a lab. In the lectures you will learn about the techniques, methods and theoretical concepts used by archaeologists to study the past. In the labs you will learn how to recover, record, classify and interpret archaeological information, and you will practice using the tools of the archaeologist.
