# **Course Description:**

This course examines humans and our closest relatives within the context of evolution and biological anthropology. In the first part of the course, we will start by reviewing the history of evolutionary thought, leading up to modern evolutionary theory, including genetics, variation and the mechanisms of evolution. These principles will inform our discussions on primate and hominin variation and evolution in the latter parts of the course. The second part of the course will focus on the Order Primates, including investigations into the characteristics that make primates (including us!) unique among mammals. We will cover the major primate taxonomic groups and their evolution, distribution, locomotion, ecology and social behavior. In the final part of the course, we will examine our own evolution through the fossil, archaeological and genetic record as we follow our lineage from the early hominins through the emergence of the genus Homo and finally into the first appearance of anatomically modern humans. We will end with a short discussion of modern biological anthropology and our own species.
