## **Course description**

This course provides an introduction to research and theory on nonhuman primates. The first part of the course focuses on why we study primates, how primates are different from other animals, and on the systematic variation within the primate order. The second part of the course concentrates on evolutionary theory and how it can be used to explain primate grouping patterns, mating strategies, and social relationships. In the last part of the course, we will discuss primate life cycles; modes of communication; cognitive abilities and theories regarding the origins of primate intelligence; primates' role in the ecological community; and threats to primates and the prospects for their long-term survival.

## **Course objectives**

Students will become familiar with the history and the motives behind primatology as a scientific discipline, theories regarding the evolution of primates, different taxonomic groups within the primate order, and the traits that characterize these groups. Students will understand how evolutionary theory can be applied to studies of primate grouping patterns, behavior, life history, and cognition. The students will gain knowledge of how primates interact within the broader ecological community and learn about primate conservation issues. To meet these objectives, students have to do the assigned readings, attend lectures, and participate in group discussions.

The two midterm exams are non-cumulative and will include multiple-choice and short answer questions.
