This course will introduce the student to the peoples and selected social institutions of North Africa. Coverage will span the Maghrib, Egypt, Northern Sudan and the Sahara. Approximately the first third of the course will take an historical perspective, emphasizing recurrent patterns of interaction in North African history from the earliest times to the present. The second two thirds will concentrate on ethnographic studies of particular North African societies, including nomads, townsfolk, peasants, and tribal societies as well as heterodox religious communities and minorities.

Required Texts

A reading package, *Ethnographic Survey of North Africa*, is available at University of Calgary's Bookstore and some readings will also be posted on the Blackboard before the lecture day.

Quizzes: Quiz No. 1 will cover the physical and political geography on North Africa, and is intended to ensure that students have some idea of the locations of places, knowledge of which is presupposed in the lectures and readings. Quiz No. 2 will cover linguistic distributions and the location of important ethnic groups. A study guide for each quiz will be distributed previously.

Country Review

The student is required to pick up Egypt, Libya, or Tunisia and briefly discuss the political situation before and after 2010. The review should not exceed three pages double-spaced and it must include the location of the country, population, and main economic activities in introductory paragraphs.



Midterm and Final Examinations

These examinations will have a similar format. There will be a number of short-answer questions (identification, definition, contrast) plus one or two short essay questions, which will be selected from a list of topics which will have been previously distributed.
