Course Description:

This course examines anthropological approaches to the study of sex (the genetic distinction between male and female), and gender (the socially and culturally constructed ideas about what it means to be male and female). We first focus on the sex differences between males and females, and will include discussions of evolutionary theory (e.g., sexual selection), primatology, and human origins research. For the remainder of the course, we examine masculine and feminine gender constructions through discussions of motherhood and fatherhood, gender differences in the public and private domain, the controversy over gender differences in learning, and gender stereotypes in the media. We also look beyond the two-sex, two-gender system we have in North America and discuss gender variance in our society and around the world.

Course Requirements:

Evaluation for this course will include two midterms and one final exam. Exams are **not** cumulative. All exams will be multiple choice format, and will be based on lecture material, textbook and online readings, and films for the period prior to the exam.

An outline of the lecture notes will be posted on Blackboard prior to class, and students are encouraged to print these and bring them to class to assist with handwritten note-taking. In addition to assigned readings, exams will be based on all material covered in class, including lectures presented (instructor and guest lectures), class discussions, questions and answers, and films. Any classroom materials missed due to absenteeism are the sole responsibility of the student.

Although related and generally complementary, the material in the textbook and readings are not tightly integrated with the lectures. These should be considered as separate sets of information, all of which must be mastered for the exams. Note to pay special attention to areas in the textbook and readings that overlap with class lectures.

It is expected that each student will behave with courtesy and respect toward others. To maintain a distraction-free environment during the class period, the instructor requests that you 1) turn off cell phones prior to class and place them in a bag, pocket, or under your desk; 2) do not carry on conversations while the instructor is speaking; 3) avoid late arrivals and early departures (if you

must depart class early, please notify the instructor in advance if possible). If you use a laptop during class, please refrain from any activities unrelated to class, including emailing, web browsing, playing games, etc. Please minimize disruption to your fellow students by sitting at the back or on the classroom periphery. If the use of a laptop becomes too distracting to the class, you will be asked to turn off the computer and use a paper notebook for the remainder of lectures. It is also rude and unacceptable to sleep during class. Relevant interruptions with questions or comments are welcome by raising your hand and sharing with the class. You may also email questions which will be answered in the next lecture. All email inquiries about exams will be answered in class.

Exams

Exam security is taken very seriously. Since exams will be taken in class where students often must sit close together, please be aware that wandering eyes could lead to suspicion. Keep your eyes on your own exam or to the front of the room. Also, cover your own exam to stop others from being tempted to look at it. Please remain seated during exams until you can leave the row you are sitting in without disturbing others. If you are caught cheating, your exam will be taken and a grade of zero will be given automatically.

Students are strongly urged to take all exams on their scheduled times and dates. Missed exams will automatically receive a score of zero. Accommodation for missed exams will be made at the instructor's discretion in the event of a **documented** emergency (e.g. hospitalization). In the event of an emergency or illness, you **MUST** notify the Anthropology Department office (220-6516) or the instructor **BEFORE** the exam, and documentation **MUST** be provided before a makeup exam will be considered. Failure to follow these guidelines will result in an exam score of zero. Note that performance on makeup exams is typically lower than those taken with the class.

Exams will not be returned to students. The instructor will review portions of the exams in class the week following the exam, by which time scores will be available on Blackboard. If you would like to consult your exam, you may come to posted office hours, or make an appointment. If, after consulting the key, your notes, and the readings, you still have concerns about the grading of your exam, you will be asked to provide a detailed written statement outlining your concerns. Your exam will then be re-graded in its entirety, and scores will be raised, lowered, or left unchanged as warranted. Deadline for submission of written statement is one week after the results of an exam has been posted.

No special arrangements will be made following a poor performance on an exam. For example, we cannot change the weighting of the exams, allow retakes, or accept alternate assignments in lieu of an exam. Please prepare in advance to ensure satisfactory exam performance as no changes will be made after the exam.
