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**COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Introduction to the African Stone Age with emphasis on sub-Saharan Africa. Major cultural developments are explored through archaeological data, as well as other disciplines, including biogeography and geoarchaeology. The focus is on major chronological events and the cultural processes that characterize the Palaeolithic era on the continent.
