COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides a continuing introduction to the theory, method, and practice of archaeological reconnaissance and survey. Survey theory and development of theoretically informed methodology are emphasized. As a continuation of ARKY 531-02, students are offered training and experience in advanced aspects of field work as well as with laboratory and report writing procedures. Lectures by cultural resource management professionals and Government of Alberta officials form an important part of the course. Students also conduct analysis of materials and sites encountered during earlier field work and produce a final heritage resource impact assessment report on their field work.

Lecture topics include but are not limited to: (1) reconnaissance and survey theory; (2) site mapping and recording; (3) artifact analysis and photography; (4) basic sampling procedures.

TEXTS: There are no required textbooks. Required readings will be assigned weekly.
