Course Objectives:

In this seminar course, human health, disease, and diet are investigated from the perspective of both modern and prehistoric peoples. Techniques used to identify disease and trauma from skeletal remains are covered. We will also be examining methods used to detect past diet and subsistence practices. Emphasis is on the use of this information to better understand people of the past. Specifically, the objective is to comprehend human evolution and adaptation in relation to diet and disease - the co-evolution of humans and their parasites, genetic adaptation to disease, cultural buffers, and modern problems that can be traced back to prior adaptations.

Readings:

There is a fair amount of reading expected in this course as this is an upper level undergraduate/graduate seminar class. It is the student's responsibility to read and understand the material prior to class in order to contribute to the discussion of the topic. As indicated in the lecture and seminar schedule, required readings must be read.
